- Expect a Six Flags Great America ticket for your child in May!


Once your child is registered, you will have access to your online account.

The Week in Review

English Language Arts (E.L.A.)

We are approaching the end of our historical fiction text about the San Francisco earthquake of 1906. The students have shown an array of emotions for these interesting characters: fear, empathy, intrigue, horror. This week we zeroed in on the author's word choice that helped to convey the key details in the text, such as the struggles the characters endured or the severity of the fires. As we wrap up our reading we will discuss the central message and reflect on how the characters changed as a result as the experiences they had.

A new component to our foundational skills lessons is our ever-engaging game show! In this game, two students face off and use clues from the audience about a word to guess that word. Ask your child about Game Show - Compound Word Edition. We will next be learning about the different spelling patterns for the long i sound and will incorporate this into our new game. The patterns that we will focus on are igh, y, i_e, i and ie. As you are out in the community, look for words with these patterns on signs, menus, books, commercials, etc. to reinforce this skill.

<u>Math</u>

We began Unit 5 this week. This unit helps students imagine, visualize and count the number 1,000. The unit began with an engaging story, How Much, How Many, How Far, How Heavy, How Long, How Tall Is 1000? that helped students understand that 1,000 objects can be represented in many ways, depending on how those objects are organized and arranged. Students worked to build place value understanding as they counted and organized numbers up to 1,000 using a variety of manipulatives including craft sticks, base ten area pieces, and Unifix cubes. Through the use of these manipulatives in the coming weeks, students will have numerous opportunities to create and count bundles of 10 and 100.

We will soon be working with place value with money, so now is a great time to brush up on those coin counting skills at home. Have your child identify and count groups of coins. It is great skip counting practice!
