### The Week in Review

#### **English Language Arts (E.L.A.)**

We continue to learn more and more about the 26th president, Theodore Roosevelt, in our read aloud, including what he valued and why people thought he was so unique. Within the non-fiction text, students are learning to use non-fiction text features such as photographs, captions, fact boxes, headings, maps and more. These non-fiction text features give us even more details to support what we are learning from the main text and deepen our comprehension of the text.

We have begun to extend our reading and writing skills as we began researching other important historical figures for a biography research project. A focus of this unit is asking and answering questions, but not just any questions. We are really focusing on thought provoking questions which require the reader to gather several details together to come to a conclusion, rather than simply locate the information "right there" in one sentence. Students first partnered up to interview each other. They were given the task of generating who, what, where, why, when and how questions for the interview, based on the questions they had about their classmate. Students are now in research groups and working to write though provoking questions about a historical figure before reading to research about the person. Ask your child who he/she will be researching to learn more about.

#### <u>Math</u>

We have begun to explore customary units of measure using traditional and invented tools. We measured the distance across the classroom using heel-to-toe footsteps of the teacher and several students and found that our results varied widely. We needed far fewer "teacher feet" than "student feet." Even different student groups needed different amounts of steps to reach the same distance. This set us up to consider the need for standardized units of measurement.

We then read the story Jim and the Beanstalk, a variation on the classic Jack and the Beanstalk tale. We compared a teacher foot (12 inches) to a giant foot (1 yard). Students then worked as a class to measure the distance across the room in giant feet and compared the measure to the same distance in teacher feet. This started the discussion about the fact that measurements vary depending on the size of the unit.

#### <u>Inquiry</u>

We are just beginning our investigation of matter. Students are learning that matter exists in one of three states or phases: solid, liquid, or gas. Matter is anything that takes up space and has mass. As we continue to learn, we will find out that matter is made up of atoms and molecules. Millions and millions of these tiny objects fit together to form things. The atoms and molecules don't change, but the way they move does. We will observe and discuss changing states of matter and identify different forms of matter in the world around us.



## **Measuring Fun**
